Pastor's Perspective Of Building Boats and Churches

A decade or so ago, having flipped through a funeral home's copy of Wooden Boat magazine, I got a bad case of "boat fever" and decided to build a small wooden boat. I had never owned a boat, had rowed or paddled a boat only occasionally, and knew absolutely nothing about boat-building. However, I could read and knew how to teach myself. I trusted that my willingness to learn and my rudimentary carpentry skills would suffice – if only I could find the right book to guide me. Fortunately I did. Though I no longer remember the book's title, I will never forget the author's advice: "First, get into the right state of mind." There is wisdom in this approach whether one is building boats or growing the ministry of a congregation.

In building boats the right state of mind includes patience, calmness, the ability to adapt and solve problems with the resources at hand. While these same traits are useful in growing the ministry of a congregation, to them must be added what St. Paul called the "mind of Christ."

(2) Make my joy complete: be of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. (3) Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. (4) Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others. (5) Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus... (Philippians 2)

Translating this into practical terms, it means we seek harmony in our life as a congregation (vs. 2). While united in the mission of knowing Christ and making him known, we will always have differences of view between ourselves and others over how best to achieve this goal. As we evaluate these differences we should bear in mind the feelings and needs of others (vs. 3-4).

A particular church activity may not do anything for us spiritually, but it may well be profoundly moving for others. Some find traditional, liturgical worship to be boring. Others find contemporary worship to be confusing or lacking in meaning. Rest assured that either form of worship can glorify God and speak into the hearts of those God is calling. We struggle with the political views or social values of fellow congregants. Yet at some level we are aware that, like us, the persons holding these views contrary to our own are trying in good faith to follow Jesus in their lives.

On August 13th, 1727 our Moravian forebears embraced "the mind of Christ" as a model for their life together. After a period of divisive argument, chronic complaining, and discouragement they set aside their non-essential differences, united in the same mind and love, and went forth to make Christ known throughout the world. Two hundred and eighty four years later the task, the challenges, and the solution remain the same. Rich opportunities for ministry lie before our congregation but first, we must get into the right state of mind.

The Scoutmaster's Minute, by Jim Roberts, Scoutmaster of Troop 362

Summer brings a slower pace to many aspects of people's lives, and Boy Scout Troop 362 is no exception. The troop moves to two meetings each month, on the first and third Thursdays, to maintain activities but at a lower level. We continue to have an outing every month – for the June 3-5 weekend we went to Rickett's Glen State Park (just West of Hazelton). Everyone completed a wonderful hike from the mountaintop lake down a steep path next to numerous marvelous waterfalls (as high as 94 feet!), ending 1000 feet lower on the mountain. The trip back up followed a portion of the same path, but then split to another branch of the stream for a different set of waterfalls. Overall the hike was 8 miles long. For such outings, everyone sleeps in tents, the scouts do all the cooking (and cleaning!) after having planned the meals, and we work on rank advancement activities as time permits. Saturday night always has a campfire, and Sunday morning includes breakfast, breaking camp and cleaning up the area, and a Scouts' Own non-denominational church service before returning to Bethlehem. Most weekend campouts follow a similar pattern. July is Summer Camp at Camp Minsi (near Mount Pocono) from July 17-24 (more on Summer Camp in a future Scoutmaster's Minute). The Senior Patrol Leader just led the troop in a planning exercise to lay out the troop calendar for the next year; the Troop Committee will discuss it and perhaps make a few small modifications at our next Troop Committee Meeting. Girl Scouts Thrive at East Hills Moravian Church

Girl Scouting has had a very active and successful year again at East Hills Moravian Church. Four (4) troops that have met here, include:

- Brownie Troop 8795 had 10 second and third grade girls.
- Cadette Troop 8961 had 9 sixth grade through eighth grade girls.
- Senior Troop 8225 had 12 ninth through twelfth grade girls.

The Daisies and Brownies met weekly from January to May. They learned about the Promise and Law, and went on outings such as camping and mini-golf.

The Cadettes met twice each month from September to May. They learned to put the Promise and Law into action, helped with a Service Unit Sock Hop Event, assisted with the collection of Baby Bundles for Turning Point, and went on outings such as camping.

The Seniors met weekly from September to May. They learned to make the Promise and Law part of their every day life, planned and executed a Constructing Confidence Event for Daisies, Brownies and Juniors (first through fifth grade girls), planned and executed a Nutrition Event for Juniors (fourth and fifth grade girls), engaged in a service project for girls at Valley Youth House, helped facilitate the collection of Baby Bundles for Turning Point, and went on outings such as camping and an overnight trip to New York City.

The troops also assisted in Girl Scout Sunday, as well as the Sunday school between, and coffee hours that followed each worship service, participated in the Cookie Sale, and assisted with the service project to make and fill birthday party bags for the food bank.




Why Knots




Your thoughts, words, and actions are like individual notes that work in concert to create the power of one person – YOU – to make a difference. You can harness your "power of one" if you simply:


