Unity – Secular and Sacred

What's a penny worth? Though its purchasing power is quite limited, this least valuable of coins can remind us of the precious values which undergird our nation. Engraved on it you will find the word "liberty" and the phrases "In God we trust" and "*E pluribus unum*," which means "out of many, one."

Achieving unity in the midst of diversity is challenging, laborious, and seldom glamorous. It requires persistence, patience, and compromise. In the struggle to make the many into one there are few "Kodak" moments. No wonder we celebrate July 4 as a national holiday rather than Sept. 17 or March 4 – respectively the dates on which the Constitution was adopted and went into effect. Yet it was the Constitution, and not the Declaration of Independence that forged thirteen colonies into a nation. For most persons the concept of freedom is more appealing than the thought of compromise.

In this era of increased political and theological polarization we desperately need reminders - both secular and sacred - of the possibility of the many becoming one. The penny, the Great Seal of the United States, and the flag can function in this way for us as a nation. Christians belonging to the Moravian denomination can look to the Cup of Holy Communion which, for over 550 years, has been a potent symbol of our religious liberty and unity.

It was followers of Jan Hus, martyred on July 6, 1415, who founded the ancient Moravian Church. In the time of Hus priests frequently denied lay persons the opportunity to drink from the cup during Holy Communion. Hus believed this practice went against the will of Christ as expressed in Scripture: "Then he took a cup, and after giving thanks he gave it to them, saying, "Drink from it, **all of you**; for this is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins." (Matthew 26: 27-28) Hus insisted that the laity, as well as the clergy, partake of both elements of Holy Communion (i.e. bread and cup).

Thus the chalice, or cup, soon came to signify the liberty of each person to respond to Christ's invitation to share fully in Holy Communion. The cup also symbolized unity because all who drank from it became one in Jesus Christ regardless of their social class, gender, or status in the church as layperson or clergy. This understanding is reflected in the lyrics of early Moravian hymns.

... **"with one cup and with one bread, thus one cov'nant way we tread.
One in spirit, one in life, one amid earth's frequent strife;" (#525)**

We invite you to join us Sunday, July 8, as we celebrate Holy Communion in observance of Hus' martyrdom, in celebration of our unity, and in exercise of our religious freedom.

Health And Wellness News

Have you ever eaten kale?

I had my introduction to kale during a recent trip to Idaho to visit our daughter, Heidi. In her Boise suburb, there appears to be a much closer relationship between people and nature. Running shoes and bikes are seen everywhere with plenty of outdoor activity. Kids actually play outside and are frequently seen running barefoot in the grassy, green spaces dotted throughout her planned community. Organic produce abounds. In fact, Heidi belongs to a community garden where the participants attend organic gardening classes and then do their “homework” in the fields. In my casual observation, people seem to be “leaner” and more active, even athletic. It just seems like a healthy place to live.

Now back to kale, which is available in the Lehigh Valley too! We have a wonderful assortment of farmers’ markets and stands offering a great variety of local produce, and our area is also surrounded by trails and parks, rivers and lakes.

There is a growing concern in the healthcare community about the increasing percentage of obesity, even among children. As waistlines increase so do the risks of heart disease, type 2 diabetes, and even certain cancers. As the number of patients with these illnesses increase, the cost of health care will also increase. These rising health risks and costs should concern us all.



Where does the church stand on these issues? And where does EHMC stand? Do we simply sit back and say that these concerns do not affect us directly? Or do we take a stand to promote health and wellness right here on our own church campus? Is it too radical to suggest that we should look more seriously at the amount of fat and highly processed carbs (sugars) in the foods served right here at church, as well as in our homes? Would anyone like to join me in an effort to promote healthy changes in our church eating habits?

It won't be easy. There is and will continue to be resistance. Change is never easy, especially when it involves personal habits. But in order to provide a healthier life for the next generation, we all have to acknowledge the problem and work together toward the solution. So why not start by trying kale?

Here is a recipe for Kale Slaw, which Heidi and I made and enjoyed in Boise.

Kale Slaw: Wash and dry large bunch of kale; remove ribs; cut thin strips crosswise. Toss with some veggies if desired: thinly sliced onions, carrots, radishes, colorful peppers; tomato wedges. Pour the following peanut sauce, processed in a blender until smooth, over the vegetables: ¼ cup peanuts; ½ cup vegetable oil; ¼ cup cider vinegar; 2 tbsp. brown sugar; and ½ tsp. coarse sea salt (or to taste).

Invitation to Holy Conversations – Sunday, September 30, 2012

In response to the Provincial Synod of 2010, East Hills will be hosting a second round of conversations about the ordination of gay and lesbian pastors in committed relationships. Your pastor and the Board of Elders encourage you to attend this session of Holy Conversations Regarding Human Sexuality on Sunday, September 30, if you were unable to attend our previous sessions.

The Northern Province is seeking the collective wisdom of its members by considering a number of questions for the sake of our future together. These questions have been designed by the Human Sexuality Task Force of the Northern Province. The more of us who participate in discussing these questions, the more truly representative and useful this process will be in guiding the Synod of 2014 as it convenes and considers this important issue.

Even if you do not have a special interest in this topic we encourage you to attend a Holy Conversation session which will introduce you to a method the church is using to explore potentially controversial issues. In the future the same format may be used both locally and on the denominational level as we consider Provincial restructuring, church finances, and a variety of social issues.

Our gathering will use a circle or circles to facilitate the Holy Conversation. Each person will have the opportunity to respond to a set of optional questions while the rest of the group listens respectfully to their insights and experiences.

East Hills participants in the last session found the Holy Conversations to be a great opportunity to grow as a community in faith.


Caring for Our Church


