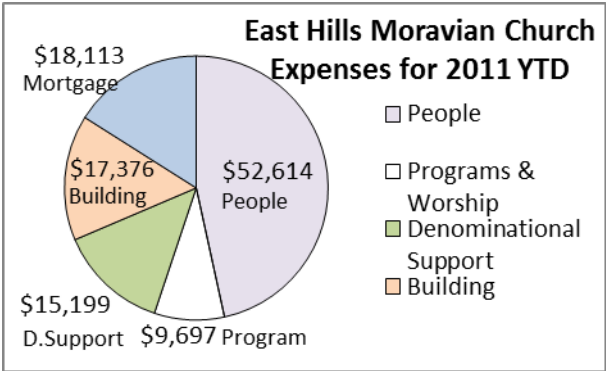
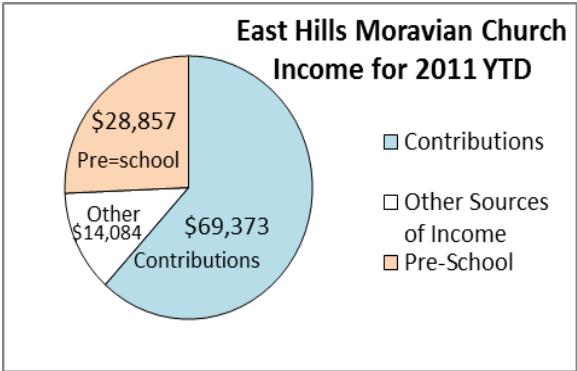
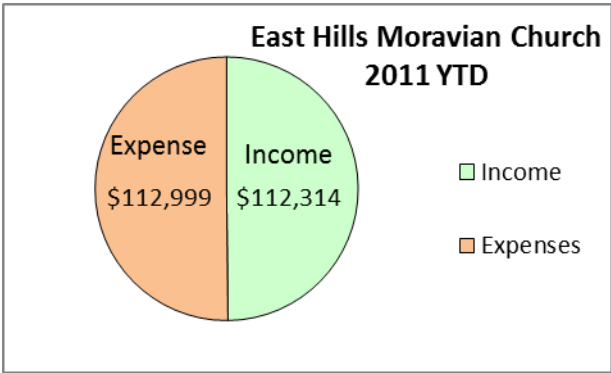

# Health and Wellness

Safety in the home is obviously something of concern to all of us. Falling is one of the most common causes of injury in the home and prevention can often be about using common sense. Good examples include turning on lights, keeping pathways clear, and wearing sturdy shoes that fit properly; not carrying more at one time than you can reasonably handle; making additional trips or getting help as necessary.

As we age, we may become a bit more unsteady on our feet. Aging is inevitable, but we can find ways to make day-to-day living easier, and safer. We can get help with difficult tasks, and use a walker to provide steadiness on our feet. Other things we can do include: muscle strengthening and balance training at home, prescribed by a physician or other trained health professional; Tai Chi exercise programs; home hazard assessment and modification; careful use or even withdrawal of some medications that can affect balance and stability in consultation with a healthcare provider.

Many falls in the home occur in the bathroom, due primarily to slippery conditions. Sturdy grab bars installed in key locations can be a relatively inexpensive way to help prevent falls. They can provide added steadiness in the bathroom, shower and tub. They can help you to get out of the bath or up from the toilet, ultimately making you feel more secure. I am sure that you have all seen these provided in public areas. While they are primarily meant to assist people with disabilities, they also improve the general safety for all who use these facilities. It is unsafe to rely on towel bars for this purpose, since they are usually held in place with a single light duty fastener or an adhesive. Given a good tug they will fail, with the person holding on falling to the floor.

The above information comes from the American Medical Association (AMA) website, where it is stated that 10% of Emergency Room visits have to do with the elderly falling. Falls can occur anywhere, and we can't prevent all of them. But we can modify our homes to minimize our risk of falling, and this is especially important for us as we age.

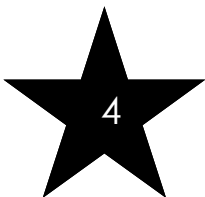
## BCE News

## A Scoutmaster's Minute By Jim Roberts, Scoutmaster, Troop 362

The Boy Scouts of America has three primary aims (character development, citizenship training, and personal fitness, both mental and physical) that guide the program. There are eight methods used to reach these aims. Today's topic is "adult association," one of the keys to guiding scouts as they develop from boys to young men that are leaders. While I am certainly biased, I believe Troop 362 is blessed with a variety of skilled adults in key positions. Every adult leader is trained in the official BSA Youth Protection Guidelines. Dr. Sally Haggerty has been the Troop Committee chair for roughly 20 years. As a pediatrician, she often helps the rest of us understand how to deal with scouts on many levels, and is trained as both a committee member and as a Scoutmaster. I have been Scoutmaster for 11 + years, and have been to Philmont for a special training course ("For Scoutmasters Only"), and have taken almost every training course available at the local council level. The East Hills Moravian Church Charter Organization Representative is Steve Thompson, my predecessor as Scoutmaster of Troop 362. Steve has been to Philmont for training also, and has served in a variety of roles at both the district and council level, including a current term on the Minsi Trails Council Executive Board. We have a number of other long-term adult leaders, all of them trained, including John Arno, Bernie Suess, David Ellis, Dr. Jack Worsley, and several others. We have new adults joining as their sons enter the troop. All of the adults listed also contribute at the district level, the council level, or both. Finally, our Unit Commissioner is Jay Larson, a former Scoutmaster of Troop 318. Jay is an "external guide" and is an additional information conduit between the troop, Minsi Trails Council, and the church. 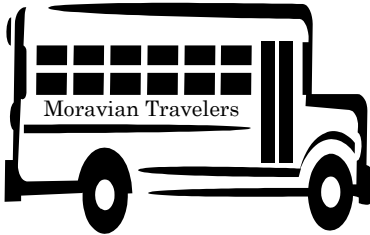


## Men's Bible Study is Back

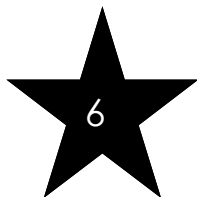

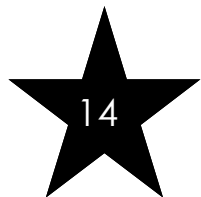

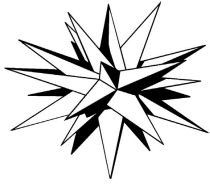
